Face to face appointments are available to all patients, but you may be asked to discuss your conditions over the phone or online first.

Patient Health & Wellbeing

If you have still not had your flu jab, contact Reception who can make you an appointment. This year, 3 types of flu vaccine will be used in the flu programme.

- (1) Adjuvanted trivalent flu vaccine (aTIV) This is licensed for people aged 65 years and over.
- (2) Quadrivalent vaccine (QIV) This is recommended for people under the age of 65 years who are at risk from flu because of a long term health condition or women who are currently pregnant. It is important that this group of patients are treated first. As per the new government guidelines for 2020 only due to Covid 19, patients who would like a vaccine aged between 50 and 65 will need to contact the surgery to arrange an appointment towards the end of November.
- (3) Live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV) This is a nasal spray and is licensed for children and young people from 2 years old to less than 18 years of age. The age groups targeted in England for this vaccine in 2020/21 are two and three year olds (through GP surgeries) and school aged children in reception class through to year 5 (through schools).

Shingles Vaccinations

Aged 70 years? You are eligible plus anyone in their 70s who was born after 1 September 1942 and has not yet had the vaccine. If you are unsure whether you are eligible, contact Reception who can let you know.

Medicals and Insurance Reports


If you require a Medical for the DVLA or your HGV Licence, this is something our GP's can help with. They can also complete medical reports and questionnaires for insurance purposes and provide letters for reasons such as travelling with medication. In most circumstances there will be a fee, which will require full payment up front before any work is undertaken. For more details and for pricing you can enquire at Reception. Please note; as this is all classed as private work it will not take priority over day to day GP administration, therefore we advise you notify us of your requirements in plenty of time.

Aldborough Surgery Dispensary

Please may we remind you that the Dispensary requires at least two working days for prescriptions to be dispensed once your order is placed. Although we will try to dispense sooner this is not always possible. If you are approaching the last week of your supply of medication, please take the opportunity to place your order then so that you don't run out. This will also allow us more time to fit in a medication or other review should one be needed.

Orders for medication can be made by telephone to the Dispensary on Monday and Wednesday between 9:00am and 10:30am, and every weekday between 2:00pm and 4:00pm. Please telephone: 01263 768819 to make your request. We understand that you cannot always order your repeat prescriptions during our designated hours, so why not do it online? Simply visit the Dispensary with a form of photographic ID, and they can give you a password to log in to Systmonline with. You can order your repeat prescriptions and book GP appointments at the click of a button! This would save you waiting to get through on the phone or until their telephone

lines open at the allotted times.

Covid-19 Closure

This time last year the Community Centre was buzzing with activities and, as well as regular bookings, the Aldborough Players were getting busy rehearsing the pantomime. Life was busy. Sadly the Covid outbreak forced the closure of the Centre last March and just when we were contemplating re-opening, the second wave hit. In order to be able to re-open, even for activities



which might be deemed "Covid-safe" it would be necessary to have available many more volunteers to "police" activities and to sterilise the centre after each use. Unfortunately we do not have enough able bodies to be in a position to re-open at present so, sadly, the Management Committee has decided that we must close again. It is hoped that we will be in a position to re-open next year.

Upkeep

The Community Centre was built in 1884 and like all old buildings it needs a great deal of money to keep it fit for purpose. Our main sources of funding are the hire charges and profits from the bar which are generally sufficient to cover running costs and basic maintenance costs. The Parish Council had the building surveyed by a firm of Chartered Surveyors which identified important maintenance works required both internally & externally. The Management Committee has secured a grant of £10k which will allow us to complete the internal works in time for reopening. The external works are estimated to cost between £60k-£80k and the Parish Council is working with the Management Committee to secure funding for these works.

Facilities

If you are not familiar with the Community Centre, it is a magnificent building which houses a superb main hall together with stage, a well equipped kitchen, comfortable bar room (with well stocked bar which is run by volunteers), WiFi, a

full-size snooker table, a table tennis table and badminton net, not forgetting the sound system, massive screen and overhead digital projector.

Activities

Until lockdown we were proud to have the building in use most days of the week including ballet classes, chess, dominoes, the busy Village Care lunch club, bingo, bridge, snooker, table tennis, history group, art group,



Spanish bowls, zumba, farmers market. Throughout the year we have the annual flower and vegetable show, Christmas carol service, parish council meetings, quiz nights and the popular Aldborough Players. The Centre is also a popular venue for dances, wedding receptions, children's parties, and even funeral wakes.

I have greatly enjoyed meeting and working with residents in Aldborough during the visits I've made so far, and I was pleased to be able to help secure replacement supplies of flu vaccine following the power failure at the local GP surgery.

2020 has undoubtedly been a very tough year. However, as we put this year behind us, there are some glimmers of hope. We can expect the first round of Covid vaccinations early in 2021, and as the Health Secretary assured me



recently, there will be "plenty of vaccine for North Norfolk". Residents and staff in our care homes will be amongst the first to receive the new vaccine.

Did you know.....

• In December 1843 the first Christmas card was sent. JC Horsely designed the card at the request of Sir Henry Cole. 1,000 were made and sold in London.

• The Sunday before Advent is called 'Stir up Sunday' when Christmas puddings were traditionally made. Each member of the family would stir the pudding and make a secret wish. Only wooden spoons should be used to for stirring, to remind people of the wooden crib. The Christmas pudding was stirred from the east to the west in honour of the Wise Men who visited baby Jesus. Originally, the puddings had 13 ingredients, to represent Jesus and his disciples.

- Hanging stockings out comes from the Dutch custom of leaving shoes packed with food for St Nicholas's donkeys. He would leave small gifts in return.
- Mince pies were originally large beef pies, to remind people of the cows that were in the stable, where Jesus was born.
- In 1647 Oliver Cromwell banned Christmas festivities. The ban wasn't lifted until 1660!

He also said that the reindeer are particularly fond of Aldborough's carrots so if any families have one spare he'd be very grateful!



Other attractions

Emergency Plan

Because of this isolation it has been decided that it could be helpful when an incident occurs to have a village emergency plan. Once complete this will be available on the website or via email and will show who to contact in an emergency situation where it is not suitable for regular 999 services or they are not available.

Village Benches

Around the green are a surprising number of benches to sit and enjoy the village. Some are past their best.

So over the coming 6-8 months they are undergoing a program of refurbishment. Each is being assessed and where necessary repairs conducted prior to weatherproofing.

This will necessitate removal of some for periods of time and others will be out of action whilst cleaned and painted. Please rest assured it looks like they are all savable and we hope to have them looking great for summer 2021.

STEPPING STONES PRE-SCHOOL

We love the autumn term as there is so much to explore and learn about. Coming back from the half term holiday we have had Halloween and Fireworks and then before you know it, it will be time to celebrate Diwali. While all the time enjoying and observing the changes in the season. We will of course be performing a deep dive into all things Christmas very soon so watch this space!

Letters and Sounds

This half term we are holding daily group activities where we explore instrumental sounds. This gives the children opportunities to hone their listening skills and develop their vocabulary while laying the foundations for future reading. At home you can explore different instruments, make your own sound makers, play around with volume and rhythm, provide a soundtrack to your favourite story book or make up different moves to different sounds.

Personal, social and emotional development

This is our primary focus for the children and as they learn to take turns, ask for what they need, share resources and work collaboratively we can see their confidence, self-esteem and vocabulary grow.

Tapestry

We have started using an application called Tapestry where we can update and share with you how your child is developing and activities they are doing. We would love to see photos and videos of family life so we can talk about them with your child at pre-school. It helps them to make sense of their two worlds at home and at pre-school, provides fantastic opportunities for talk and language development, and helps them to understand what makes them unique and what they have in common.



VILLAGE PLAY AREA

The second lockdown has this time fortunately left the Village Play Area open. Unfortunately not all users are following the guidelines issued by the government. Please can we remind everyone that you must follow strict Covid regulations if you want the play area to remain open.

There is a genuine danger we may have to reconsider the decision to keep it open.





VILLAGE SCHOOL

As the year draws to a close, I could not be more proud of how the community of Aldborough Primary has united and supported each other during the many challenges and changes – there have been quite a few! We have all had to explore new ways of working, thinking creatively, whilst ensuring that our children's learning continues to be the very best that it can be.

While learning and playing in bubbles has become familiar; staggered drop off and collection, along with staggered play and lunchtimes, have become the new norm, and anti-bacterial wipes have become the new pritt sticks of the classroom, teachers have continued to provide high quality, fun lessons. 


Merger

Rectory Farm Pig Farm Planning Application

There have been significant developments with regard to the Rectory Farm Planning Application over the past few months.

Concern of the impact on the village to house 1900 pigs in 2 new units 200ft long by 23ft high at Rectory Farm resulted in formal public objections being lodged on the NNDC portal from 104 individual addresses in and around Aldborough.

Refuting 2000 pigs previously on site/ and claimed 'reduction' to proposed 1900 pigs

Contravention to NNDC's Conservation Area policy

Pollution and ground contamination

Biodiversity & ecological damage

Odours

Noise

HGV Traffic

Pathogenic and zoonotic risk (such as SARS, swine flu, Covid-19, etc.) Health and nuisance effect on 30 residences within 250m of the site

In addition, the 'SAVE' campaign group, (Save Aldborough Village Experience www.aldborough.uk), funded by donations from village residents totalling in excess of £6000, has submitted a solicitor's legal challenge and an independent odour report, to challenge the Planning Application.







Furthermore, a formal objection from Aldborough & Thurgarton Parish Council was submitted to NNDC on 19th August and on 28th October the Parish Council sought clarification from NNDC as to progress with the Planning Application. NNDC's case officer, (Alistair Curran) wrote to the Parish Council on 3rd November with significant clarification & commitments, summarised as follows;-

NNDC committed to review and reconsider their 'screening' decision which previously rejected the need for a full Environment Impact Assessment.

NNDC committed to not determine the Planning Application until the Applicants have properly address all of the issues raised by the NNDC's Landscape Officer and Environment Health Officer.

Once the Applicant submits further documents to address the issues raised by the Landscape Officer, Environment Health Officer and others, these documents will be reviewed by NNDC's solicitor, the Environment Health Officer and NNDC's in-house ecologist.

NNDC will then open a 3rd publication consultation period.

In light of the above points, the back-log of cases, and the 2nd lockdown, scheduling of the Planning Application to NNDC's Development Committee is now likely to be in early 2021, and certainly won't occur in 2020.



POLICE NEWS

Cromer Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT)

The normally quiet and peaceful village of Aldborough has recently been victim to acts of anti-social behaviour. Items have been removed from gardens, left in different locations and windows smashed.


Police from Cromer Safer Neighbourhood Team increased patrols in Aldborough and liaised with those affected by the incidents. Two people have been spoken to and one of those has admitted their part in some of the incidents, showing remorse and has engaged positively with the Police. The incidents are being dealt with by way of a Community Resolution where those responsible have written letters of apology to the victims.



Incidents of anti-social behaviour appear to have stopped after an increase in police patrols. High visibility patrols will continue in the village when not committed with other duties.

Beat Manager Pc Joey Mezzetti encourages people to report incidents via the 101 for non-emergencies or 999 for emergencies so that police can deal effectively with any incidents.





COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

Volunteers Required

Volunteers are needed to help tackle the common complaint of speeding in Aldborough.

Community Speed Watch was launched in 2007 and is a project working across Norfolk empowering communities to play an active part alongside

the Police and the Safety Camera Partnership in tackling the problem of speeding in our neighbourhoods. A team of volunteers (minimum of 6) are issued with a speed radar gun, Community Speed Watch signs and reflective jackets. Volunteers are given full training and site risk assessments are completed by the police.



Speed checks are carried out in 30 and 40mph limits, the volunteers record details of offending vehicles and these are sent to the Safety Camera Partnership team. A warning letter is sent to the registered keeper of offending vehicles and persistent offenders may be visited by police.

North Norfolk's Community Engagement Officer, PC Pete Davison said "Community Speed Watch is there to promote road safety, we would rather educate drivers than prosecute them. We have successful schemes set up in many towns and villages across North Norfolk, it really does reduce speeding and I feel that Aldborough would see real benefits from having a Community Speed Watch team. For anybody that is fed up with speeding I would encourage them to get involved with Community Speed Watch".
