### **VILLAGE CARE**

#### Future of Village Lunch

Our event in the Community Centre on Saturday 14th August was so well supported; it was lovely to see so many people out and about again and enjoying the wonderful spread laid on by Jean and Mandy. We welcomed representatives from the new Community Centre team, the Church and the Parish Council, keen as we were to hear your

views about all aspects of village life. Village Care's biggest question concerns the future of Village Lunch, whether it should be restarted as it was or whether we want to look at any changes. We listened to your views and several filled in our simple questionnaire.



Opinion is really divided on this issue and the Village Care committee will be meeting to decide on the way forward. If anyone would still like to voice an opinion, please do. The alternative under consideration is to make it a more informal, drop-in event (like Saturday's), with the smaller tables and a selection of buffet food available as a lighter lunch. We would think about adding in craft tables or card and board game tables. We would like to attract more people who live in the village and to stress that it is for the whole community, not just older folk.

Elaine Hayton has organised Village Lunch for many years and would now like to step down. We should like to thank her for all her hard work, which has been really appreciated by so many for so long. This does mean that we need to find someone to help keep it going, particularly to oversee the administrative side.

#### **Extra Equipment available**

Village Care has recently acquired two walking frames to help people with restricted mobility access the Community Centre from their cars and to move around inside it. These are kept in the cloakroom recess in the foyer and can also be lent out to people who may have temporary need of one. These are in addition to the wheelchair already owned by the Community Centre.

#### **Table Tennis Table**

Twenty years ago the Parish Council considered a request for a table tennis table on the Green (it was rejected as being too expensive). Now we finally have one, thanks to a generous legacy given to Village Care. It arrived at six o'clock on a Monday

### **BUS SERVICES**

# We are fortunate to have 2 bus companies who provide a service here in Aldborough.

During the week Sanders runs a bus (No. 18) that leaves The Black Boys at 9.35 to Cromer, returning at 13.10 from the bus station. Also at 9.35 opposite The Black Boys a bus leaves for Aylsham and North Walsham, returning at 11.20 and 13.20 (North Walsham) and 11.45 and 13.45 (Aylsham).

On Saturdays the bus goes to Cromer at 9.35, returning at 13.10. The one to North Walsham and Aylsham leaves at 10.25 and returns at 11.55 (North Walsham) and 12.15 (Aylsham), going on to Cromer.

Feline runs 3 services from Aldborough at the top of the Green. On Tuesdays it leaves at 9.10 for North Walsham (Waitrose and Sainsburys), returning at 11.40. On Wednesdays it leaves at 9.20 for Wroxham, returning around 12.30.

Bus passes mean that for many of us these journeys are free and we are helping to reduce car use. Bus use has really dropped off during the pandemic and, if we want these services to continue, we need to support them.

### **READING A HOUSE** Thatch and Pantile

### Aldborough is fortunate to have a range of different types and ages of house: some with elements that date back to at least the sixteenth century.

Walking around the village becomes even more interesting when you learn to read a building. The materials, construction, proportion and decoration of the different



elements of a building (roofs, walls windows etc.) can tell you much about the house once you learn how to read these features.


Looking across The Green the varied styles, materials and finishes can readily be appreciated. In this view Chesterfield House, Fernleigh House and The Old Post Office all have a steep roof pitch which belies the pantile roofing material as the original finish. Steep roof pitch is typical of thatched





roofs. The only remaining thatch in the village is The Thatched House, but there are a few that have roof pitches which indicate that they were once thatched. Because of the fire risk, maintenance costs and the vagaries of fashion in the early eighteenth century many thatched roofs were replaced by pantiles. Pantiles became available from the mid-seventeenth century onward and became particularly popular due to Dutch imports during the reign of William and Mary at the turn of the eighteenth century.

The northern gable of Chesterfield House also shows how the house was extended upward from a single-storey house with accommodation in the attic to a full twostorey house with a slightly more shallow (but still thatch) roof pitch. A similar process is evident on the eastern gable of Fernleigh House, facing Thurgarton Road, where a much earlier single-storey gable is 'fossilised' within the later extended



gable. The older gable shows diaper work, the use of dark-faced bricks to make diamond-shaped patterns in the brickwork. This type of pattern is typical of Tudor brickwork and suggests that there was a single-storey building on the site in the sixteenth century. After that time, this type of pattern does not reappear in buildings until Victorian revival styles became fashionable.

Pantiles are much lighter to install on a thatched roof than plain tiles, having about two-thirds of the weight of flat roof tiles. This allowed the earlier roof timber structure to be retained through

the change of material. Norfolk is noted for its use of glazed black pantiles and a good example of this can be seen on the early Georgian 'gentrification' of Fernleigh House and The Old Post House, where the earlier timber-framed cottages have been upgraded with patterned brick elevations on the south, facing The Green. These roofs, on close inspection, are striped with alternate glazed and unglazed runs – a purely decorative detail.

Faden's Map of Norfolk (above) surveyed during 1790-1794 and published in 1797 correlates well with the roof pitch observations. The property to the north of The Green, now Fernleigh House and The Old Post House, can be seen across the road from The Black Boys. Chesterfield House is one of the properties on the western side of The Green and the former Red Lion can be seen to the south. The track at the side of Manor Farm, then the Old Hall, is also shown clearly. All of which goes to show that reading the current buildings can provide a good basis for understanding documentary evidence!



### **FLUSHING AWAY POVERTY!**

### One of the projects we are undertaking at Aldborough Church is to twin our composting toilet with a toilet in an overseas poor community.

This scheme is run by Tearfund; as little as  $\pm 60$  will fund a new toilet for a community which hitherto had no access to sanitation or clean water. The facts and figures around sanitation are shocking:

- It is estimated that 2 billion people don't have somewhere safe and hygienic to go to the toilet (WHO/Unicef).
- The lack of a toilet makes women and girls a target for sexual attack as they go to the toilet in the open, late at night.
- Almost 1,000 children die every day from preventable diseases linked to dirty water and unsafe toilets.
- 663 million people live without safe water (Unicef).
- Every year, women and girls spend 97 billion hours finding a place to go.

Let's be honest, in Aldborough, most of us take our sanitation for granted and cannot imagine what it is like to have no access to clean water and sanitation.

This is where Aldborough Church needs your help. We will be having a collection at the Aldborough Harvest Service and Celebration to fund the Tearfund twinning toilet project. Donations can be made during the Celebration (in recycled envelopes) or if you cannot attend the event, please make donations to Aldborough Church with a covering note to say it for the Tearfund Twinning Toilet project. ### **ENCHANTED APRIL**

# What a delightful production the Aldborough Players provided last month!



Written and directed by Dee Jupp, this adaptation of Elizabeth Von Armin's bestseller was staged at the Community Centre, using much of the available technology to excellent effect. There was a gasp from the audience at the particularly charming and evocative filmed sequences in the old railway carriages. However, the whole atmosphere created by the script, the set and the well drawn characterisation

was excellent. Add to that the strong performances from an experienced cast and

the total effect was impressive and engaging.

All roles were convincingly played. Among the lesser characters was a three some of servants, whose sequence of conversational Italian prompted spontaneous applause on the night we attended – and, ingeniously, translations appeared above the respective actors.



The action was set in the 1920's and involved four women who are strangers spending a month together in an Italian Castle. This offered plenty of scope for a



production rich with a period set, costumes, matching manners and music of the time. The design and implementation team behind this deserve recognition. So do the back stage personnel who ensured that the smooth 'flow' of the plot was barely disturbed by the frequent minor scene changes.

In normal times this production would merit high praise. In the context of lockdown

restrictions it was particularly remarkable; originally the play was scheduled to be performed in June



2020, but rehearsals were impossible, public gatherings became illegal and the Community Centre was closed indefinitely. Subsequently, rehearsals took place in a very cold barn and eventually on stage.

In the end the result was a triumph over these many adversities. The Players should feel proud of their achievement. Certainly their effort provided an enchanting evening for their audience.





### VILLAGE VOICE

#### Dear Editor,

#### IF YOU HAVE COMMENTS WHICH YOU WOULD LIKE FEATURED PLEASE DO LET US KNOW.

In Issue 5, in the two articles by Duncan Baker MP and Saul Penfold, Norfolk County Councillor, I was astonished that neither mentioned what they intended to do about the lack of proper services in North Norfolk for those suffering from mental illness. This applies to both Norfolk and Suffolk NHS Foundation Trust( NSFT) and to Norfolk County Council Social Services which are both responsible for providing essential services for those with serious mental illness and have both suffered from serious underfunding for many years.

Severe cuts have severely damaged what used to be an excellent service in North Norfolk and we have seen a big increase in the number of suicides in our area. In particular the closure of over 100 psychiatric NHS beds in our area has made it difficult for staff to ensure the safety and proper treatment of patients and has led to many severely ill patients being sent hundreds of miles away to private hospitals, not only at an unnecessary cost to the NHS, but also severe cost of distress to patients and their relatives. Other service users have had to wait months before even being seen and assessed.

The North Norfolk branch of the Campaign to Save Mental Health Services in Norfolk and Suffolk have been fighting to get NSFT to set up a Walk-in NHS Psychiatric Clinic in North Norfolk (possibly in Cromer) to enable those in need to receive treatment swiftly and not have to wait many months for help or even just for an assessment, which is the current situation.

It is positive that we now have a Mental Health Practitioner available on a Monday at our local GP surgery. However, we in the Campaign are concerned that she will struggle to help those with severe mental illness because of the lack of those multi-disciplinary services that are essential in mental health in order to provide proper treatment.

The North Norfolk Campaign will be having a series of meetings with NSFT and the Norfolk and Waveney Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) in order to establish what changes are needed in North Norfolk. If you wish to contribute to this, or have a particular issue you wish to be raised feel welcome to let us know and if you want join the Campaign contact us by email (nnmentalhealthcrisis@ gmail.com) or ring me


### MANNINGTON HALL CHARITY DAY September 5th 11.00-17.00


### So what's involved in being a Councillor?

For example the Parish Council is registered owner of both the Village Green (which it manages) and the Community Centre (which is managed by its own committee). Decisions are often related to the Green which is such a focus for our village and to village events and even the publication of this magazine.

an interim, informal steering group will be hosting this event with a proposal to set in motion the development of an entirely new local community group, incorporating the assets, and background of both old groups, but focusing very much on the future.

Most of the evening will be informal discussion. Your ideas and input are most welcome. Complimentary drinks for all. After more than 18 months of pandemic and extended lockdowns, all of us have had to change dramatically

our lifestyles and working habits. During this period most of us have rediscovered and come to value highly our local outdoor spaces, both private and public and it seems unlikely that as a society we can return to the old 'normal' any time soon.

As the outgoing Chair of Aldborough Gardening, I think this is absolutely the right time to try and launch a new style of community group which can work collectively and informally to improve all our local surroundings and enhance social contact. It could also be a lot of FUN!

# **GARDENING CLUB - ALLOTMENT**

The idea of a Community Allotment came about a couple of years ago and Bob and Sheila Evans put a lot of energy into setting it up, applying for a Grant for a polytunnel, creating raised beds and generally producing lovely vegetables and salad produce. Although a group initially helped create the paths and set the raised beds sadly it was largely left to Bob and Sheila.



This spring, Bob and Sheila needed to step back from the allotment and it was agreed that another member of the committee of the Garden Club would take responsibility for it. During Spring and early Summer, the polytunnel was integral in producing the Sunflower seedlings which we were able to give away to villagers and the allotment has been "gifted" seeds, vegetables and salad plants. There are tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines and melon all growing in the polytunnel at the moment and in raised beds we have rhubarb plants, raspberry canes, strawberry plants, pumpkins, leeks, courgettes, carrots, potatoes and outside tomatoes and cucumbers.

The community allotment is usually manned on Wednesday afternoons between 2 and 4 pm. If you would like to help and be part of a small group working at the allotment, do pop along and see for yourself.

Stepping Stones have planted some Sunflowers on the plot as well as potatoes, which they will harvest when preschool resumes in September. If you would like to plant a raised bed or just get involved in some way, email t.hooker@talktalk.net.



### FAREWELL TO BILLY HAMMOND (1926 - 2021)



A special man, a farmer, a village character, a real gentleman who always raised his cap, who had a wonderful smile and a rather charming sense of humour. A man who liked things to be done properly and who lived a long life to the full.

George William Hammond (Billy) was born at Thurgarton on 20th July 1926 and it is doubtful that anyone will witness such changes in a lifetime as he did – from working horses and no electricity, through a world war, to the incredibly mechanised and technology driven world of today.

He left school at the age of 14, soon after the war broke out, to work on the home farm. In 1941 he joined the Aylsham Air Training Corps, hoping to join the RAF. That same year a German bomb, intended for Matlaske airfield, landed near the farmyard in Thurgarton creating a huge crater, damaging the farm house and blowing Billy out of his bed at 11 o'clock at night. There are still fragments of the bomb in the vintage tractor shed. Although accepted into the aircrew, he was released from training when his father became ill and he returned home to help on the farm.

In 1948, aged 22, Billy managed to get a farm of his own, where he kept cattle, sheep and pigs along with the arable.

In his words, happiness arrived when at Aylsham YFC he met a pretty girl called Anne Betts. They married in 1952 and enjoyed a happy marriage until Anne sadly died in 2011.

In 1960 Billy took over the farm from his father. The 60s were an exciting time for farming and the farm business grew as a result of his endeavours. Hobbies and outside interests eventually became more important and he enjoyed travelling to Russia, China and the USA on 'business' trips, and taking holidays with Anne to

Kenya, Gambia, Europe, Morocco, Barbados and many more places.

He started amassing his wonderful vintage and veteran machinery collection, which he loved showing to visitors. This included three vintage steam traction engines along with countless vintage tractors and combines. He enjoyed playing golf and bridge and threw himself into office-holding. A brief list includes: founder and chair of Holt and District Rabbit Clearance Society, 22 years Chairman of the UBIDB, founder member of Aylsham Grain, 4 years chairman of Aylsham Growers, 12 years chairman of Aldborough Parish Council, President of Aylsham Show, 10 years chairman of Aldborough Cricket Club, moving on to be President, and President of Holt FC.

As Chair of Aldborough and Thurgarton Parish Council, Billy was always "hands on" and involved in village life in very practical ways. He once described his relationship with Ruth Bayes (then Vice Chair) as ideal, as

he represented the spade and she the pen. He was in the chair at the time of our twinning with the French village of Villiers St. Denis. It is his signature on the twinning charter displayed in the Community Centre. He embraced the opportunities afforded by this connection, visiting Villiers and entertaining new French friends, both in the village and in his home. He hosted the official twinning ceremony in his barn and mischievously delighted in the fact

that, as the French found it hard to say 'Chairman of the Parish Council', they dubbed him the 'Mayor of Aldborough'. It is touching that an email was received from Villiers expressing sadness at his death.

He was a family man who welcomed each new generation into this world and took great delight



in following their progress. He leaves 3 children, 9 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. He also leaves the community he loved and served with very many fond memories.

#### **Rectory Farm Planning Application (PF/20/0578)**

North Norfolk District Council has recently (20th August 2021) reconsidered the application and decided that "...Local Authority cannot rule out a Likely Significant Effect in ElA terms and therefore further information and assessment is required as part of an Environmental Statement...". Furthermore NNDC stated that "...the Local Authority consider that an Environmental Statement is required and that we have insufficient information to progress this application at this time." Pick Associates have indicated they will appeal this decision.

NNDC also recently commissioned an experts report to look at some of the issues raised by previous consultation with the village. This can be viewed on the planning website at www.bit.ly/PigFactory and makes interesting reading.

#### So what does this mean for the development?

#### Currently the application is on hold and cannot progress.

The promised third consultation period (your opportunity to comment by writing to NNDC or submitting letters directly on the NNDC planning website) will be postponed until the outcome of the appeal which will be heard by the Secretary of State (actually by his representative). We don't know how long this will take currently and will publish information as soon as we have it.



#### What happens after that?

If the decision is upheld then the applicant will have to carry out a far more detailed assessment of the environmental impacts of the development. This will, we understand need to be published and extensively publicised – you will have a right to see it and read it/consider it and then make further comments to NNDC.



If the appeal overturns the NNDC decision (or after the publication of the Environmental Assessment Report if it does not) then the matter will once again be opened for public consultation. We will do our best to publicise this within the village so you can have your say on this major development.

NOTE:- This update has been drafted at short notice following a very recent development – more info to follow.

#### **Rivers in General**

Meanwhile, in July The Guardian published an article about the plight of UK's rivers, highlighting the catastrophic impact factory-style livestock farms have on them. The reporter, George Monbiot, also produced a short film entitled "Rivercide", which can be viewed on YouTube (www.bit.ly/Rivercide) This is highly relevant to the *Scarrow* 

*Beck*, a rare natural chalk stream, which runs into the river Bure and ultimately into the Broads.

### Is a change in the law required?

S.A.V.E. has also requested the Minister at DEFRA to review the legislation governing pig fattening factories with less than 2000



animals, to try to ensure that the proximity of "sensitive receptors", (people, wildlife, waterways, etc), is a factor when issuing environmental certification.



### **MUSCLE THERAPY**

In our occasional series on unusual and interesting jobs and charities within the village we have previously heard from a Shepherdess and a charity helping in Ethiopia. This month we have a report from Jon who runs a muscle therapy service from Aldborough.



"How does a civil engineer with 16yrs service in local highway authority suddenly decide to quit a job, with security and pension and risk becoming a self employed massage practitioner and yoga instructor in rural North Norfolk? Its got to be a mid life crisis right?

Well it wasn't sudden, it had been in the

back of my mind for many years. Let me ask you a question - how many of you have contemplated the condition of human society and see it as being plagued with physical and emotional suffering? If you have acknowledged this either in yourself or others, what is the answer? what are your options? Well, there is no silver bullet or magical cure for everything, and neither should there be. The one thing people seek from life is to be comfortable. Everything we do drives us toward this goal. and guess what, every commercial entity knows this and wants to sell you a solution or path towards that comfort. And yes I am part of that, but my intention is not to get you hooked on a never ending supply of stuff you don't need, I want to lead you toward a self sustaining version of you which is healthier and happier physically, emotionally and spiritually. What I use to do this isn't just massage therapy and yoga classes. It's much deeper than that, it is the philosophy, values and techniques going back thousands of years combined and applied with care and intuition. So, a little more on these techniques and why I have chosen to learn these.
